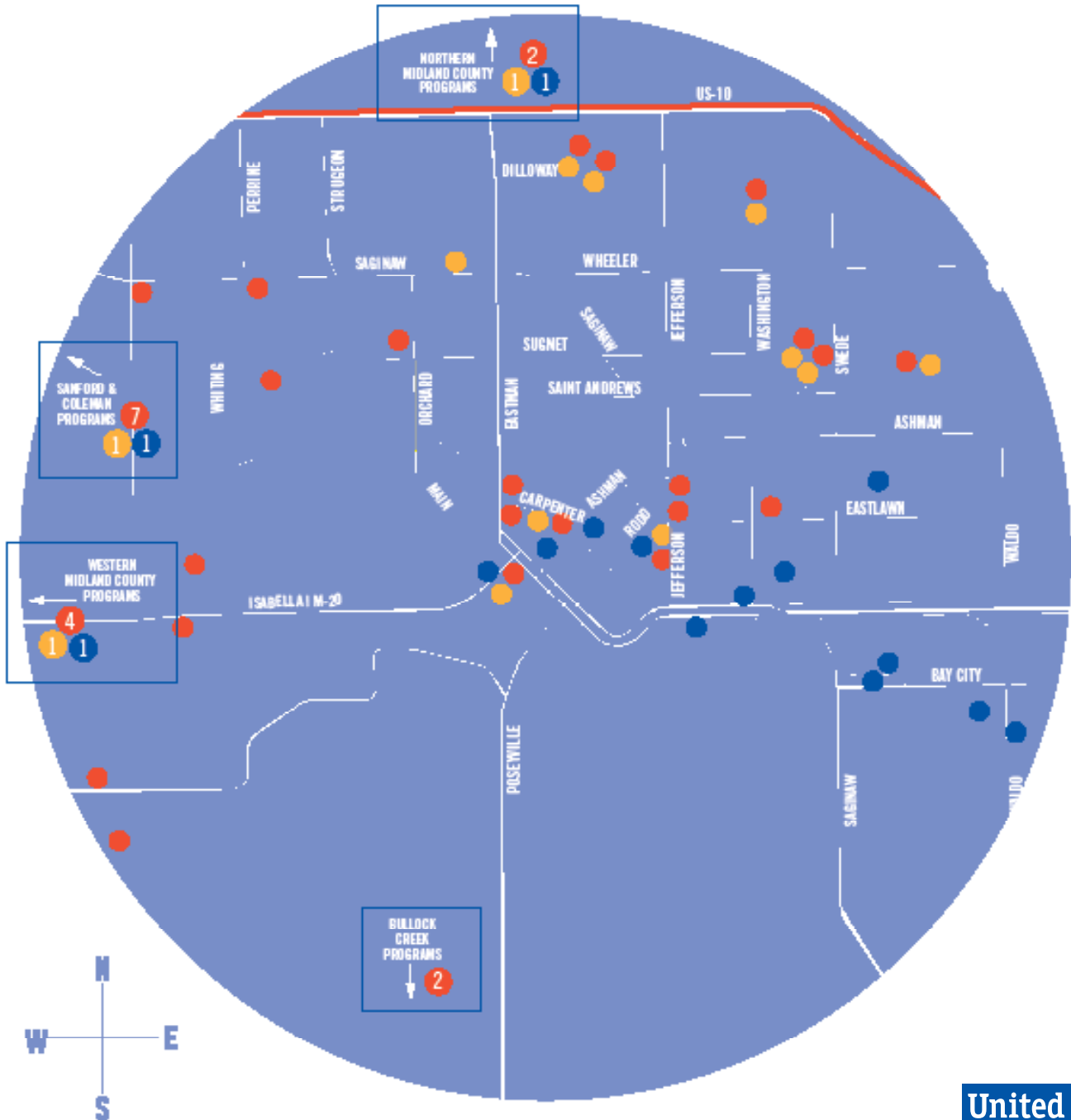

Safe & Sound Child Advocacy Center provides information and advocacy to prevent child abuse and neglect and improve the quality of life for children in Midland County. United Way funds support Safe & Sound's forensic interview program. This interview and case management service focuses on the child victim of suspected sexual or severe physical abuse. The forensic interview strives to minimize or eliminate trauma to the child by coordinating the questions and concerns of the mandated response team into one non-threatening, fact finding interview. The multi-disciplinary team, composed of representatives from entities legally mandated, ensures the welfare of the child and handles any potential criminal proceedings. During the interview a case coordinator provides the non-offending caregiver with support and advocacy, counseling resources, and information to empower and cope. Following the interview, the team members meet to review their findings and coordinate their response to best protect the child.
