THE IMPACT OF YOUR SUPPORT

EARLY CHILDHOOD SUCCESS

Kindergarten Readiness

- 153 at-risk children received high-quality preschool scholarships
- 1,952 kids birth through age 5 received free age-appropriate books monthly

Reading at Grade Level

- 8 kids were matched 1-to-1 with a weekly reading mentor
- 88 kids matched with a tutor to overcome reading struggles

YOUTH EDUCATION

Youth Mentoring

- 19 at-risk kids were matched 1-to-1 with a weekly after-school mentor
- 62 at-risk kids matched 1-to-1 with a caring adult mentor
- 30 at-risk high schoolers received leadership training and college exploration

Skills Building

- 1,500 students were taught life skills and empowerment in the classroom
- 401 middle and high school kids had a safe and nurturing after-school experience
- 56 students with a disability were equipped with employment skills and job coaching

PHYSICAL AND MENTAL WELLBEING

Fitness

- 644 low-income youth, adults and seniors participated in fitness programs

Access to Healthy Food

- 815 seniors received regular home-delivered healthy meals and friendly visitors
- 387,496 pounds of food was rescued and distributed (approximately 322,913 meals)
- 575 children received nutritious food for the weekend when school meal programs are not available

Mental Health

- 849 fragile people received counseling and crisis services
- 575 people facing cancer received counseling and support groups

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OVERCOMING CRISIS

Domestic/Sexual Violence

- 1,702 survivors of domestic violence received shelter, support and counseling
- 683 survivors of sexual assault received support and counseling
- 162 child survivors of abuse were supported with a forensic interview

Addiction Recovery

- 208 people were supported during recovery (including detox, counseling and peer support)

Crisis Support

- 18 individuals and families received immediate help during a disaster (fire, flood, etc.)
- 29 families received crisis communication with family serving in the Armed Forces
- 13,763 individuals received vital information and referrals through 211

FAMILY STABILITY

Affordable Housing

- 145 individuals in recovery had supportive and safe housing
- 501 clients received help creating a sustainable housing plan
- 30 individuals received urgent safety improvements on their home
- 10 households provided homeowner construction

Affordable Childcare

- 1,591 families received high-quality childcare scholarships

FINANCIAL SECURITY

Job skills/Employment

- 206 people with a disability received employment skills and job coaching

Financial Support

- 257 people with cancer received financial and transportation assistance
- 79 people with a disability were empowered with financial coaching and support
- 1,314 seniors received tax assistance with filing returns

Basic Needs

- 8,895 individuals/families received vital basic needs assistance (i.e. food, household, clothing, personal care item, utilities).
